The Rector's Letter



I am very grateful to the parish for the opportunity I had to take some sabbatical time these last few months. It was a unique time in my life, filled with all sorts of wonderful experiences.

Barbra and I plan to share more in depth about the sabbatical very soon, and I am sure it will find its way into my sermons and teaching in the coming months. For now, I want to make just a few comments.

Part of the sabbatical was devoted to a pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela. This is a pilgrimage Christians have been making for about 1000 years. For us, it involved walking 500 miles through northern Spain.

You might think of a pilgrimage as an extreme Lenten discipline. When you give up chocolate or wine during Lent, you are not doing it primarily to lose weight. It is a discipline that is meant to help you grow spiritually. In the same way, a pilgrimage is not just about arriving at a destination. Taking the bus would have been quicker, cheaper and much easier than walking. Instead, it is a setting aside of security, of the familiar, and of other concerns to be open to whatever God has in store.

A pilgrim becomes vulnerable. The old saying is, “Tourists give orders, pilgrims give thanks.” If it rains, you get wet; if the Camino is muddy, you are too; if all there is to eat is bread and cheese, that is your dinner. Whoever you are in your normal life, that is all left behind on the Camino. You are simply walking along with the other pilgrims, covering the same ground, climbing the same hills, crossing the same streams.

For me, as someone who has been ordained and serving in churches and missions for over thirty years, it was a very special time. Stepping away from the responsibilities and expectations that have been defining my life for decades, and becoming vulnerable on a very basic level, allowed me to experience God’s grace toward me in an almost palpable way. It gave me time to reflect on my overall life’s journey, and I found myself thankful each day.

For me the vulnerability and dislocation were freely chosen, and I always knew I had a home to return to. I was aware each day that many people in the world, especially the millions of refugees fleeing violence, have neither a clear destination nor a home to which to return. They are not welcomed as pilgrims, and their vulnerability and dislocation put them at severe risk. I found myself remembering and praying for them on a regular basis.

Now I am home, and happily back at Grace/ La Gracia. I hope that whatever spiritual growth I experienced will enhance my ministry at this parish. Thank you again for this incredible blessing!

Estoy muy agradecido a nuestra iglesia por la oportunidad que tuve de tomar algún tiempo de sabática en estos últimos meses. Fue un momento único en mi vida, lleno de todo tipo de experiencias maravillosas. Barbra y yo planeamos compartir más en profundidad sobre el sabático muy pronto con ustedes y estoy seguro de que encontrará su camino en mis sermones y enseñanza en los próximos meses. Por ahora, sólo quiero hacer algunas observaciones.

Parte del sabático se dedicó a una peregrinación a Santiago de Compostela. Este es un peregrinaje cristiano que se ha venido haciendo durante cerca de 1000 años. Para nosotr@s, se trató de caminar 500 millas a través del norte de España.

Se puede pensar en una peregrinación como una extrema disciplina de cuaresma. Cuando nos abstemos de chocolate o vino durante la cuaresma, lo que estamos haciendo no es principalmente para perder peso. Se trata de una disciplina que está diseñada para ayudarnos a crecer espiritualmente. De la misma manera, una peregrinación no es sólo llegar a un destino. Tomando el bus habría sido más rápido, más barato y mucho más fácil que caminar. En su lugar, es como poner a un lado la seguridad, lo familiar, y otras preocupaciones para abrirle el paso a lo que Dios tenga en su almacén.

Una persona peregrina pasa a ser vulnerable. El viejo refrán, "l@s turistas dan órdenes, l@s peregrin@s dan gracias." Si llueve, se mojan; si el camino es fangoso, tú también; si todo lo que hay para comer es pan y queso, esa es tu cena. Quien quiera que seas en tu vida normal, todo eso se quedó en el Camino. Usted simplemente camina junto con l@s demás peregrin@s, cubriendo el mismo terreno, escalar las mismas montañas, cruzando las mismas secuencias.

Para mí, como alguien que ha sido ordenado y sirviendo en iglesias y misiones por más de treinta años, fue un momento muy especial. Apartándome de las responsabilidades y expectativas que han ido definiendo mi vida por décadas, y que son vulnerables a un nivel muy básico, me permitió experimentar la gracia de Dios de una manera casi palpable. Me dio tiempo para reflexionar sobre mi vida de viaje y me encontré que cada día estaba agradecido.

Para mí, la vulnerabilidad y la separación fueron elegidas libremente, yo siempre supe que había una casa para yo volver. Estaba consciente cada día que muchas personas en el mundo, especialmente para los millones de refugiad@s que huyen de la violencia, no tienen ni un destino claro ni un hogar al que regresar. No son acogid@s como peregrin@s, y su vulnerabilidad y rechazo les ponen en una situación de grave riesgo. Me encontré recordando y orando por ell@s constantemente.

Walk of Grace

Engravings in Celebration – Gratitude – Remembrance

The exciting **Walk of Grace** project has been announced as a new way for parishioners to participate in the beautification and upkeep of our lovely church grounds. Parishioners will have an opportunity to engrave the pathway stones along the front and side of the church in thanksgiving of family, in memory of a loved one or in celebration of a family event. (Grace Church reserves the right to approve all text prior to engraving)

Walk of Grace engraved stone donations are \$400 for a *full stone*, \$225 for a *half stone* or \$100 *per name* on a stone with five separate names. You can see what an engraved *full stone* looks like by viewing the Cappelli family stone at the Grace Church entrance to the adjoining park. The projected net profit of \$12,000 will be used to maintain and enhance the grounds surrounding the church.

Each stone along the **Walk of Grace** is approximately 2 feet wide. A local monument stone engraver has been retained and, to date, parish members have donated 10 stones. Engraving is currently underway and stones will begin to be installed shortly.

As each section is completed the **Walk of Grace** will become a beautiful mosaic of the engraved names of those we love and, ultimately, reflect the diversity of the Grace Church congregation alongside a tapestry of colorful perennial plants blooming along its borders.

La espiritualidad de la llanura

El evangelio de San Lucas (9:28-36) tiene una narrativa la cual lee de la siguiente manera: En aquel tiempo, Jesús se hizo acompañar de Pedro, Santiago y Juan, y subió a un monte para hacer oración. Mientras oraba, su rostro cambió de aspecto y sus vestiduras se hicieron blancas y relampagueantes. De pronto aparecieron conversando con él dos personajes, rodeados de esplendor: eran Moisés y Elías. Y hablaban de la muerte que le esperaba en Jerusalén. Pedro y sus compañeros estaban rendidos de sueño; pero, despertándose, vieron la gloria de Jesús y de los que estaban con él. Cuando éstos se retiraban, Pedro le dijo a Jesús: "Maestro, sería bueno que nos quedáramos aquí y que hiciéramos tres chozas: una para ti, una para Moisés y otra para Elías", sin saber lo que decía...

Definitivamente este evangelio es como una especie de paradigma misionero para nuestra iglesia La Gracia. Nos pone de frente, por lo menos en mi opinión, con dos modelos de ministerios: el de la altura y el de la llanura. En el mismo Jesús tomó a tres de sus discípulos y los llevó a la montaña para orar y reflexionar lo cual es muy importante como ejercicio socio-espiritual. Esta experiencia de la transfiguración fue tan gratificante y emocionante que Pedro lleno de éxtasis y muy animado le sugirió a Jesús lo siguiente: *Maestro, sería bueno que nos quedáramos aquí.* Por supuesto, quedarse en la montaña dejaría como resultado el alejarse y desconectarse del pueblo, la penosa realidad de muchas de nuestras iglesias y sus ministerios. Queremos estar lejos del pueblo porque hemos creído erróneamente que ese distanciamiento nos produce un estado de misticismo o purificación que puede ser contaminado con la maldad que existe en este mundo.

Lo bueno de todo esto es que Jesús dejó muy claro que estaba en desacuerdo con ese pedido y los volvió a bajar a la llanura; a caminar con el pueblo, a escuchar al pueblo, a sentir al pueblo y a sanar el pueblo. Este acompañamiento es lo que podemos identificar como la espiritualidad de la llanura la cual se construye para trasformar a este mundo ofreciendo la propuesta de liberación de Jesús. Es importante que entendamos que subir a la montaña es de gran importancia. Es como asistir a un retiro, una convivencia, un cursillo, etc. Estos ejercicios de disciplina fortalecen nuestra espiritualidad para volver a meternos en medio de las luchas del diario vivir ofreciendo esperanza al pueblo. Lo que estamos condenando es el querer quedarse en la montaña para contemplar desde la distancia las realidades en las que el pueblo vive diariamente y tratando de ignorar los retos que esta sociedad nos presenta como por ejemplo la necesidad de ser personas

perseverantes, la necesidad de construir unidad en diversidad y la necesidad de poder vivir la humildad que nos introduce en la paz con justicia y en la quietud del corazón. Si tenemos claro que la espiritualidad siempre tiene dimensiones sociales, culturales y políticas, entonces no tendremos problema para volver a bajar a la llanura tal y como Jesús lo hizo. ¡El pueblo nos espera!

Además el compañero y hermano Jesús nos presenta en este Evangelio un paradigma para establecer relaciones con las personas en donde les da prioridad a aquellas personas que han sido marginadas o rechazadas por nuestro sistema. Esto no es una pastoral de lástima sino más bien de compasión y respeto que persigue una liberación holística. A lo largo de su vida pública, vemos que Jesús hace suya la defensa de las personas marginadas en lo económico, salud, político, género, social, religioso, etc. Entre estas podríamos nombrar las mujeres, l@s nin@s, personas leprosas, trabajadoras sexuales, inmigrantes, personas discapacitadas, etc. En otras palabras, la fe en un Dios que asume la defensa de las personas marginadas solo es real si lleva al compromiso con la misma causa. De aquí el que la iglesia al darle seguimiento a su propuesta de vida tiene que aprender a caminar con ese pueblo y asumir las mismas defensas. La praxis pastoral de Jesús recogida en los evangelios es la referencia obligada de la pastoral de la Iglesia que siente y actúa con el pueblo.

La predicación, el arrepentimiento, la evangelización, la sanación, la salvación, y la eucaristía tienen unas dimensiones sociales, culturales y políticas que definen el papel de la iglesia en la sociedad, demostrando que se entra al cielo pasando por la tierra. Todo esto debe de ayudarnos a realizar una evaluación seria sobre el tipo de ministerio que nuestras iglesias realizan. Entre las otras personas marginadas hoy en día podríamos añadir a la lista anterior inmigrantes indocumentad@s, comunidades LGBTQ, personas negras, personas indígenas, personas que usan drogas, y quienes adoran a la divinidad en otras tradiciones religiosas que no es cristiana, etc.

Es por todo esto que debemos de aprender a construir iglesias militantes y comprometidas de la llanura que le presenten al pueblo los procesos de liberación. Esta es la experiencia del Evangelio que debemos compartir.

¿Sabes cuánto vales en realidad? (Anónimo)

Una pequeña parábola para darse cuenta que valemos mucho más de lo que pensamos.

Alfredo, con el rostro abatido de pesar se reúne con su amiga Marisa en un bar a tomar un café. Deprimido descargó en ella sus angustias...que el trabajo, que el dinero, que la relación con su pareja, que su vocación...todo parecía estar mal en su vida.

Marisa introdujo la mano en su cartera, sacó un billete de 50 dólares y le dijo:

- Alfredo, ¿quieres este billete?

Alfredo, un poco confundido al principio, inmediatamente le dijo:

- Claro Marisa...son 50 dólares, ¿quién no los querría?
Entonces Marisa tomó el billete en uno de sus puños y lo arrugó hasta hacerlo un pequeño bollo.
Mostrando la estrujada pelotita verde a Alfredo volvió a preguntarle:
- Y ahora ¿igual lo quieres?
- Marisa, no sé qué pretendes con esto, pero siguen siendo 50 dólares, claro que los tomaré si me lo entregas.
Entonces Marisa desdobló el arrugado billete, lo tiró al piso y lo restregó con su pie en el suelo,
levantándolo luego sucio y marcado.
- ¿Lo sigues queriendo?
- Mira Marisa, sigo sin entender que pretendes, pero ese es un billete de 50 dólares y mientras no
lo rompas conserva su valor...

- Entonces Alfredo, debes saber que aunque a veces algo no salga como quieras, aunque la vida te arruge o pisotee, SIGUES siendo tan valioso como siempre lo hayas sido...lo que debes preguntarte es CUANTO VALES en realidad y no lo golpeado que puedas estar en un momento determinado.

Alfredo se quedó mirando a Marisa sin decir palabra alguna mientras el impacto del mensaje penetraba profundamente en su cerebro.

Marisa puso el arrugado billete de su lado en la mesa y con una sonrisa cómplice agregó:

- Toma, guárdalo para que te recuerdes de esto cuando te sientas mal...pero me debes un billete NUEVO de 50 dólares para poder usar con el próximo amigo que lo necesite !!

Cuántas veces dudamos de nuestro propio valor, de que realmente MERECEMOS MAS y que PODEMOS CONSEGUIRLO si nos lo proponemos. Claro que el mero propósito no alcanza...se requiere de la ACCIÓN para lograr los beneficios. Yo sé que se puede y que existen innumerables caminos para conseguirlo.

WELCOME BACK



FAITH IN ACTION

The newly formed Grace Church group that is named the Fellowship for Justice, Freedom, and Peace, and Care for Creation (getting its name from the Prayers of the People, Form 6,) got an early start on its planned programs for the 2016-17 school year with a seminar in the Library on Sunday, August 28th.

Over 20 people engaged attentively for 1 ½ hours in a discussion of Israeli/Palestinian issues. This is an area of the world where justice, freedom and peace are sorely missing from the lives of the Palestinian people who live under Israeli occupation. This is in complete disregard of international law. Human rights abuses are a fact of daily life for Palestinians.

Led by Priscilla Read, there was an overview of the land and the abusive conditions there. Additional impassioned comments came from Robert Herbst and Natalie Kabasakalian who are chapter coordinators for Jewish Voice for Peace – Westchester. They have expertise in international law and human rights. They pleaded with us to “find our voice” to join in the cause of peaceful change in this region. This is not a religious conflict, but a conflict over land and water. Those of us with a Christian conscience need to become informed and vocal in working for positive, nonviolent change.

There was time at the end of their remarks for a vibrant discussion from the whole group, with many special comments from Grace members who have themselves visited the Holy Land.

Be on the lookout for further programs presented by this newly-formed Fellowship as the year progresses. Future programs will likely address issues of food insecurity involving the offering of letters for Bread for the World, human rights abuses throughout the world at the anniversary of the Declaration of Human Rights in December, and conservation at the time of Earth Day in the spring. As Christians, we are called to care for others and the world God has created. If these issues concern you and you want to put action into your Prayers of the People, you are welcome to join the Fellowship which has been formed.





What have you found to be most rewarding of those experiences?

"Most rewarding has been my role for the past 10 years teaching a stretching and toning class, primarily to seniors, through StayFit, which is based in Scarsdale. The classes emphasize flexibility, balance and well-being. Many of our clients feel this activity contributes greatly to their continued capacity for enjoyable independent living."

What about Grace Church has impressed you most?

“As a Puerto Rican, I find Grace Church’s commitment to the Latin community inspiring. 
¿Qué acerca de la Iglesia de La Gracia te ha impresionado más?

OH, WHEN THE SAINTS GO MARCHING IN

Tuesday, November 1st, is All Saints Day (for adults) and Sat., Nov. 2nd is All Souls Day (for children). These are designated as holy days in the Christian church to honor the memory of all those who are “dead in Christ.” As you may recall, Paul wrote to the Thessalonians because they were concerned about death and especially about those Christians who had already died. He wrote to them to reassure them that all past and present believers would have a glorious eternal life in Heaven with God. In many places in Scripture, all believers are referred to as saints. So All Saints Day is a day to consider and appreciate how God is at work in the world through the work of the saints – all of us! And those who have gone before us! It is often a time when many of us choose to especially honor our own loved ones who have died.

In Latino cultures, All Saints Day is called the Day of the Dead and families spend the day at the cemetery graves of their loved ones. In fact, all cultures concern themselves in some way with death and many social and cultural practices are related to how you view death and whether or not there is anything after death. So this Day of Remembrance gives living Christian saints a great opportunity to witness about our belief in eternity with God made possible by the resurrection of Jesus.

So how did this holy day of remembrance come about?

From earliest times, living saints have tried to be agents of change in the world, just as we are trying to do today. One way to do this is to start with what people know, such as Paul did when he drew the Roman’s attention to the statues of all the gods. When he pointed out the statue of the Unknown God, he was able to tell them this was the One True God. In the same way, the early church took the winter solstice celebration of Saturnalia and turned it around to be the time to celebrate the birth of the Christ Child

There was a great temple in Rome, called the Pantheon, where all the various gods were worshipped. An early pope in the 600’s rededicated the Pantheon and used it as a Christian holy spot to honor all the martyred Christians of the early church, especially those martyred there in Rome. Later Pope Gregory in the 700’s changed that spring celebration date to November 1st, which we still celebrate today. So All Saints Day has been around since the very early church.

Marching on through history, the Romans eventually conquered the northern provinces of Europe. There the Celts celebrated November 1st as their New Year. It represented the end of summer and beginning of winter, a time symbolizing death to them. They believed that the night before, the souls of the dead returned to earth. The Celts made big bonfires, wore costumes, and had a big harvest festival to honor the passing of their relatives but also to prevent their ghosts from returning to harm them. The Christian Romans took this festival and incorporated into it the Christian meaning of death and life eternal with God and November 1st was recognized instead as the holy day of All Saints Day. The night before was, therefore, the “holy eve” of All Saints Day, a day we know as “hallowed eve” --Halloween. And so began the current custom of dressing up as ghosts, witches, goblins, etc.

Some people do not appreciate Halloween and think of it as not Christian. However, the church has actually used it as a great opportunity to witness to the most holy celebration of eternal life in Christ as saints in God's kingdom.

As Christians we need to be constantly alert to ways to redeem the ways of the world and be positive witnesses to the truth of the Gospel as so many have done before us.

So let us use these upcoming days of Hallowed Eve, All Saints Day and All Souls Day to thank God for all the Christian witnesses who have gone before us and to thank God for the mighty works He has accomplished through them in our world and in our lives.

For all the saints, who from their labors rest,
Who thee, by faith, before the world confessed,
Thy name, O Jesus, be forever blessed.

Thou wast their rock, their fortress, and their might
Thou, Lord, their Captain in the well-fought fight;
Thou, in the darkness drear, the one true light.

O may thy soldiers, faithful, true, and bold,
Fight as the saints who nobly fought of old,
And win, with them, the victor's crown of gold.

O blest communion, fellowship divine!
We feebly struggle, they in glory shine;
Yet all are one in thee, for all are thine.

Alleluia! Alleluia!

I enjoy going to camp and seeing my friends there. I attend Camp Mohawk in White

Plains, where we do lots of fun sports, such as swimming, basketball, soccer, and “gaga”

ball. I also went to Splashdown beach during camp where they have all sorts of water activities.

2. What do you like best about school?

My favorite subject is math, which is the best part of school for me. I also enjoy my other subjects, as well as my friends and the teachers. Last year I was part of the safety patrol, which I also enjoyed.



3. Other than Christmas, what holiday do you like the best, and why?

My birthday, because I get to have fun turning a year older and getting one special present from my family. For my birthday party, instead of presents, I ask my friends to donate money to a charity called SPACE. SPACE helps educate children from a favela in Sao Paulo, Brazil. I learned about SPACE when I lived in Brazil 4 years ago.

LOOKING AHEAD

Most Sundays in the Prayers of the People, Form 6, we pray for all those who work for justice, freedom, and peace, and the care for God's creation. At Grace Church, we now have a new committee called the Fellowship for Justice, Freedom and Peace and Care for the Creation. The members are those who want to back up the words of our weekly prayers with our specific actions.

Last year two of our Fellowship members took part in Amnesty International's Write-a-thon. This global event is held each December to mark the anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Human Rights on Dec. 10th. Last year 3.7 million letters, messages, emails and tweets went out from people all over the world from those committed to making a difference in the world on behalf of those who lack justice, freedom, and peace.

There were 240,000 letters written to demand freedom for Albert Woodfox and for him to be released from prison. He was finally freed in February, 2016, after spending 44 years in solitary confinement in Louisiana.

More than half a million wrote to support girls and young women in Burkina Faso who are fighting against early and forced marriage – and it worked! The Ministry of Justice there affirmed the government's commitment to eradicating early and forced marriage and said the government felt compelled to do so after “receiving letters, emails, and correspondence from people all over the world.”

Phyoe Phyoe Aung is now free after being imprisoned in Myanmar for organizing a largely peaceful protest as a student leader. She said: “Receiving letters gives me real inspiration for what we are doing. I have begun to notice that the world is watching and cheering us – we are not alone.”

A man in Athens named Costos, who along with his partner was badly beaten in a violent homophobic and racist attack in Athens, Greece, said: “I am so moved, and I thank you from the depth of my heart – every single person, woman, man or else, that wrote even half a line and contributed to this campaign. Thank you, Amnesty, for bringing light into the darkness.”

This year we would like to include more of our fellow parishioners. We are planning to hold our own Grace Church Amnesty Write-a-thon at our coffee hours on Sunday, December 11th. Our Fellowship for Justice, Freedom, and Peace will provide all information, paper, envelopes, and stamps. In fact, we will provide pre-written letters that only need your signature if that is all the time you can spare.

Even though it is only Fall, our Fellowship wants you to be aware that this will be happening. We want you to **SAVE THE DATE – DECEMBER 11** on your calendar. We want you to not walk out the front door after those services on Dec. 11th, but to head to the parish hall to make a difference in the world. We want you not only to pray for justice, freedom, and peace, but to be one of those who actually works for those goals.

We want you to fight the bad guys with your mighty pen!!

From the Captain:



to this year's agenda was early morning training (5:30am) in Kyoto. The group found a local park and was able to get in 2 sessions of kata training before heading off to the day's activities.


